Join Clay County Communities Revitalization Association at the Historic Clay County Courthouse/Beal Center from 7-9 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 12 for "Want You More Than a Melody" Songwriters concert. The lineup of singer/ songwriters performing are:

Claire Dunn is an American country musician from southeast Colorado. After support from satellite radio as a "Highway Find" on The Highway (Sirius XM), she signed with Universal Music Group Nashville and BMG. She has opened for many notable country acts such as Florida Georgia Line, Chris Young, Miranda Lambert, Keith Urban, Hank Williams Jr. and Trace Adkins. Dunn released her debut single, "Get Out," on Dec. 17, 2013 and subsequently became the highest charting independent female artist on the Music Row Country Breakout chart in 10 years. Two more singles from her self-titled EP, "Move On" and "Tuxedo," were released in 2015 and 2016. Both charted on the Billboard Hot Country Songs and Country Airplay charts.

Daniel Neihoff is a songwriter from western Kentucky who brings with him a knack for mixing natural storytelling, amazing melodies and the right amount of humor in his work. Neihoff wrote his first song at age 8 and his talent took off from there. Many of his lyrics are based on family stories and life experiences — the kind perfect for a song. Whether it was playing paying gigs or open mics at Paducah's bars, Neihoff turned heads with his voice and rewarded the interest with his lyrics. The simmering burn of his talent and craft led somewhere big when at age 20, his first audition for a set at Nashville's iconic Bluebird Café was a success. In addition, he was recently a semifinalist on Nashville Rising Song. Neihoff performed in the Songwriters Showcase at the Peacock Performing Arts Center this past fall.

Rob Tiger, a local singer/ songwriter, has hosted the Songwriters Showcase at the Peacock since 2012 and was a founding member of the band, Iron's in the Fire. He plays five string banjo and guitar and his songs tell stories of local lore, stories and history that he has learned throughout life. His music influences include folk and folk rock, traditional Appalachian/ Bluegrass and Rockabilly.

All proceeds from this concert go directly to preservation and operation of the Historic Courthouse/ Beal Center through CCCRA.
